




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Welcome

It Starts in Salford

At the University of Salford, we find solutions to the hard to solve problems facing the world today. From our unique position at the heart of the community, we empower those around us to transform the everyday lives of people in our local area and beyond.

We are proud to be at the centre of the world-leading innovations around social change and economic development that have defined Salford and Greater Manchester since the industrial revolution and transformed it into the thriving city region it is today – a place where ideas are formed that shape the world.



Enabling Healthier Living

Our diverse community of researchers is made up of individuals from a wide range of practical backgrounds - health professionals, nurses, physiotherapists and more – who are now applying their real-world experiences to cutting-edge research.

We look to support a society where individuals can thrive in good health by exploring the drivers for physical, mental and social wellbeing. Our ambition is to produce healthier outcomes for all, through prevention, diagnostics and care, and through linking health and social innovations.

We are focused on issues around health inequity, including for socially excluded or marginalised individuals and communities whose voices are often not heard and regularly have poorer health outcomes. Our researchers are guided by the fundamental principle that inclusivity drives the development of a service - engaging the people with lived experience to understand the challenges and barriers, as well as working with the nurses and the other healthcare practitioners who are delivering those services.

We collaborate with our partners and those with lived experience to co-create evidence-based interventions, policies and educational initiatives that empower individuals and communities to live in the healthiest possible way - leading to a higher quality of life and better longterm health outcomes. Our impact and knowledge exchange activities extend to public health initiatives, policy recommendations and community engagement strategies both at a national and international level.

Research Highlights



Tackling the burden of diabetes-related complications in Uganda

A pioneering research project led by a multi-disciplinary team from the University of Salford worked in partnership with local nurses in Uganda to tackle the growing burden of diabetes-related complications. The collaboration brought together nurse researchers, a social scientist and a biomechanic scientist, aiming to address serious health issues such as diabetic foot ulcers - conditions that can lead to amputations and, in some cases, death. By focusing on community-based care and early intervention, the team set out to make a real difference in the lives of people living with Type 2 diabetes.

Central to the project was the belief in the power of nurse-led initiatives supported by an interprofessional team. The researchers worked closely with Ugandan healthcare professionals to implement practical strategies that improve early identification and management of complications. This collaborative model not only empowered local nurses but also encouraged sustainable improvements in care delivery by tailoring solutions to the realities of the local context.



Shaping the intensive care provision for children and young people experiencing mental health challenges

Our research aims to improve the lives and the care provision for young people who are experiencing mental health problems, working with the NHS and other care providers, as well as with young people and families themselves.

The University of Salford has partnered with the National Association of Psychiatric Intensive Care (NAPICU) for a ground-breaking research project that aims to shape the urgent and intensive care provision for children and young people experiencing mental health problems in the UK. The research will focus on developing the evidence base to improve care quality and outcomes for children and young people requiring intensive therapeutic mental health care.

The three-year project will generate new knowledge that will directly contribute to NHS England's drive to transform children and young people's mental health services through development of evidence-based services and solutions to the challenges facing children and young people experiencing acute and complex mental health needs.

Knowledge Transfer Partnership



Collaborating with business to deliver healthcare solutions

Our focus on collaborative research has led to major innovations for business and organisations in healthcare. The University of Salford partnered with mobility aids provider, NRS Healthcare, for a Knowledge Transfer Partnership to develop the revolutionary Walk Safe - a transformative new walking frame design.

The most significant innovation in walking frame design in 70 years, the Walk Safe enhances daily living and independence for a wide range of users with limited mobility, ensuring a greater level of stability.

A two-year research programme developed the new prototype, with testing in gait laboratories and care homes that showed not having to lift the frame increased users' safety and stability when crossing thresholds and doubled stability when turning.

The project is the result of a knowledge transfer partnership (KTP), a three-way partnership between a business, an academic institution and a highly qualified researcher. Going beyond simply providing access to academic expertise, KTPs drive impactful transformations for businesses.

Our Future

The New Health and Wellbeing Building

The new building will be a health and wellbeing hub at the heart of the University estate. It is a community focus for public services delivered by our partners with plans being explored for mother and child health sessions, weight management clinics and other wellbeing forums.

The site is a key part of the University's multi-million pound <u>Campus Connectivity Plan</u>, which will benefit staff, students and the local community.

Due to open in October 2026 the new building will complement Salford City Council's wider <u>Crescent Salford</u> development scheme and support healthier living for all. The all-electric building will be highly sustainable and will feature an accessible roof garden, solar panels on the atrium roof, biophilic indoor planting, rainwater harvesting, wildflower areas and native tree planting.

The new hub will provide facilities for Occupational Therapy, Sport Science, Podiatry, Prosthetic and Orthotics and Sports Rehabilitation teaching and research. There will also be a Gait Lab for analysis on the ground floor.

Our MediaCity campus is at the heart of one of the country's leading digital and media cores - sitting right next to neighbours such as ITV and the BBC.

The campus is home to our renowned undergraduate and postgraduate Film, TV and Media, Creative Digital Media and Gaming, and Journalism degrees. This high-tech, sustainable and accessible MediaCity building is a North West hot spot for talent, academia, and technology which is supported by a thriving media industry in Greater Manchester.



Future Investment



To further enhance our Peel Park and MediaCity campuses, we are investing in our people and our infrastructure to ensure that we have the means to deliver on our ambitions.

We will transform our campus and the surrounding city district through our Campus Connectivity Plan, creating a new city district that will bring together industry, education and innovation. Together with Salford City Council and The English Cities Fund we have committed to a £2.5bn 20-year Crescent regeneration programme which will provide spaces for teaching, innovation, commercial, residential, green space and sustainable travel that will drive economic and social prosperity in the region and reduce carbon emissions.
